









Conserving Nature at Sacred Sites: State of knowledge and prospects for research

Symposium held on 25 October 2011 at the University of Zurich

Nature conservationists over the last decade have begun to recognize and document the potential of sacred natural sites for preserving biological diversity. Sacred sites in this context are natural or semi-natural areas protected in the name of spiritual or religious beliefs that also offer special advantages of community-based, long-term resource management. While most studies about sacred natural sites have focused on traditional cultures and animistic beliefs, there is growing evidence that such sites located in Western, Judeo-Christian contexts also convey distinct conservation advantages. The goal of this symposium is to bring together a group of conservation researchers concerned with sacred natural sites in order to assess the field's state of knowledge, as well as to identify the most promising future research directions.
