Divergent values in sustainability assessments: love them, leave them, or change them?

An interdisciplinary conference

This conference organized by the MCC is about promising approaches to legitimacy at the science-policy interface in light of divergent normative viewpoints. What would a legitimate assessment of the desirability of alternative sustainability futures look like?

We envisage a novel practically-informative evaluation of different approaches to divergent normative viewpoints – with a particular focus on the potential and limitations of deliberative approaches. We aim to identify and discuss responses that potentially meet the crucial, though ambiguous, criterion of liberal-democratic legitimacy (excluding, e.g., dogmatic or authoritarian approaches), without falling into cynism or fatalism (e.g., radical relativism) regarding divergent values and ethics in sustainability governance.

Collaboration across disciplines is essential here. The conference therefore brings together experts from philosophy, economics, social-science and integrated assessment communities. The ambition is to inform future integrated assessment processes (such as by the IPCC, IPBES or UN Environment) and to inspire future critical-constructive research in this field.
